Black Eyed Susan



Rudbeckia fulgida fulgida

A choice subspecies that is more refined and easier to manage than the more commonly available types.

Supports native bees, small butterflies, skippers, pollinating flies and beetles, as well as several species of moths, and birds love the seed heads.

Deer resistant. Clay adapted.

Thrives in well drained or dry sites with sun to part sun. Blooms mid to late summer into fall. Grows 30 inches tall and wide.



Blooms later than the more common types, and for an extended period up to 8 weeks long. Rarely spreads, and when it does it is by seed, not rhizomes. Try with Switchgrass, Anise Hyssop, and Hairy Mountain Mint.
